Presenting group tasks

- Prepare a presentation of 12-15 minutes on the motivation, the main problem statement, and how you are planning to analyze it (= focus on theories and methods you plan to use + their expected contribution to shed light on the problem statement). What are expected results from the analysis.
 - If you already as this stage can identify ways of incorporating both parts of the course topics (environmental economics and natural resource economics) that would be nice.
 - Keep in mind this is a course in economics = limit non-economic details of the problem to 2-3 minutes of your presentation.
- Send a draft manuscript or presentation to the opposition group and me by Sunday April 26 before 8PM. “A perfect layout” presentation is not needed. Main purpose of presentation is to provide sufficient background for the commenting group to give constructive feedback.
- Respond to commenting group’s comments and discussions regarding your presentation.

Commenting group tasks:

- 3-5 minute discussion on the presenting group’s main problem, and the suitability of chosen approach to provide insights (= answers) on the stated problem statement/research questions + other questions/comments you deem helpful for overall learning outcomes.
- Critical but still constructive. Focus on main points.
